Little Man Clapping Nov 25 2021 "Little Man Clapping" is a memoir that traces the evolution of a noted professional writer from childhood on - growing up in 1950s Florida - to grad school in Southern California, from college-teaching in Washington State to social activism during "The Sixties," from editing the "alternative" Northwest Passage newspaper in Bellingham, Washington, to joining the staff of the San Francisco Chronicle as a journalist/editor. Holder of a Ph.D. in government & international relations, his perceived "radicalism" in the 1960s got him removed from the Western Washington State faculty after but a few years. His Chronicle gig lasted 19 years, 16 of them as the paper's theater critic. The San Francisco Bay Area at that time was a bubbling aesthetic cauldron of post-'60s innovation, especially in the theater, and Weiner covered those explosive developments in experimental dramaturgy with supportive passion. In so doing, the word got out nationally and even internationally that "the action" in theater in America had to include what was happening in San Francisco; reviewers, producers and theater festival scouts felt obliged to check out the exciting developments in the Bay Area. Many San Francisco productions and performers were then snapped up for tours in the East Coast and Europe. After a while, that scene's white-hot flame of creativity began to dim a bit. Weiner, thoroughly burnt-out, resigned his position and concentrated on his own creative work as a produced playwright, published poet (four chapbooks), musical lyricist, political essayist, etc. Eventually, he moved away from so thoroughly relying on words as his main artistic medium.
